August/September 2004

Five Ukrainians travel to Cincinnati to participate in the Open World Program sponsored by the Library of Congress. The focus of the program is NGO development.

March 2004

The Head of the Kharkiv Law Department and an Assistant to the Kharkiv City Mayor spend a week in Cincinnati on a legal exchange with the Cincinnati City Solicitor's Office.

February/March 2004

Eleven Ukrainians travel to Cincinnati to participate in the Print Journalism program of the U.S. Department of State Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs Community Connections program.

December 2003

Five Ukrainians visit Cincinnati to participate in the Open World Program sponsored by the Library of Congress. The focus of the program is elections and election media coverage.

November 2003

October/November 2000

Eleven Kharkivites travel to Cincinnati to participate in the City Services program of the U.S. Department of State Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs Community Connections program.

May 2000

March/April 2000

Two employees of the City of Kharkiv travel to Cincinnati as part of professional exchange of the USAID/US-Ukraine Foundation Community Partnerships Project—municipal finance.

July 1999

Two employees of the City of Cincinnati travel to Kharkiv as part of professional exchange of the USAID/US-Ukraine Foundation Community Partnerships Project.

June/July 1999

Two employees of the City of Kharkiv travel to Cincinnati as part of the professional exchange of the USAID/US-Ukraine Foundation Community Partnerships Project.

April/May 1999

10 USIA Community Connections Legal interns spend three weeks in Cincinnati to observe the federal, state, and local legal institutions and procedures.

January 1998

A delegation of eleven business people arrives from Kharkiv to participate in a four-week program of study and experience in U.S. Business. A disc jockey from the oldest, seven years, commercial radio station in Kharkiv, an English teacher from the new International Open College, a software company owner, and an individual who wants to set up a private clinic were part of the delegation.

September 1997

A third Community Connections exchange brings 11 business people from Kharkiv to Cincinnati for one month of experience with, and study of, U.S. businesses.

June 1997

Banker from Kharkiv spends 4 days in Cincinnati.

April 1997

The second Community Connections exchange brings 8 municipal, medical, and cultural delegates from Kharkiv to job shadow their Cincinnati counterparts for 3 weeks.

January 1997

CKSCP's first USIA-funded Community Connections Exchange brings 5 Kharkiv lawyers to Cincinnati for three weeks to study our local and state judicial systems.

November 1996

Kharkiv Mayor's press agent visits Cincinnati for 2 weeks to study media coverage of U.S. elections.

August 1996

CKSCP Awarded "Community Connections" grant to carry out 3-part training program in law, business, and government.

January 1995

Kharkiv Massage Therapist in Cincinnati to explore alternate therapy methods, early childhood education and U.S. prison system.

August 1994

Cincinnati medicinal massage-therapist travels to Kharkiv for professional exchange of technique and knowledge.

May 1994

Kharkiv Municipal Employee participates in National Forum Foundation sponsored 3 month training program in Washington, D.C. and Cincinnati.

September 1993

2 Legal and Law Enforcement professionals work at Chase College of Law in Legal Exchange

August 1993

4 Cincinnatians travel to Kharkiv to evaluate the on-site impact and implementation of the Municipal Training Program.

June 1993

The Municipal Training Program organized by the CKSCP and the Intl. Executive Service Corps wins a "Special Achievement" award from the Reader's Digest Foundation and Sister Cities International. (CKSCP's 4th SCI award)

4 CKSCP representatives from the Municipal Training Program meet with representatives from the Tucson-Alma Alta Sister City Project, the Intl. Executive Service Corps, the United States Information Agency, The Eurasia Foundation and Sister Cities Intl. to evaluate and compare the Municipal Training Programs in each city.

February 1993

10 Municipal Training Interns arrive for 6 weeks of education about U.S. government and local municipal management. The program includes Washington, D.C., City of Cincinnati, Northern Kentucky, and intern placements in many Greater Cincinnati area municipalities and agencies. Areas studied involved include environmental protection, taxes, international trade, economic development, charter reform, electoral process, prison reform, legislative/executive relations and citizen rights.

December 1992

4 IESC/CKSCP Municipal Training Program lecturers travel to Kharkiv for 2 weeks of lectures on our municipal and financial structures. They choose 10 interns to be brought to Cincinnati in February 1993 for a six-week program of internships with municipal counterparts.

October 1992

Two CKSCP representatives attend 3 day Municipal Training Workshop held by Sister City International in Washington, D.C. to discuss the experiences of sister city municipal training programs to date.

October 1992

International Executive Service Corps (IESC) in cooperation with the CKSCP and with funding from the United States Information Agency plan a three part Municipal Training Program for Kharkiv and Kharkiv area officials. An initial party travels to Kharkiv to lay groundwork for two-week seminar sessions for up to 150 officials.

September 1992

Professor from the OMI College of Applied Science lectures for three weeks at the Kharkiv Polytechnic Institute.

February 1992

Kharkiv Law Institute law professor lectures at Northern Kentucky University's Chase College of Law and at the UC Law School.

September 1991

3 architects begin a 2-month study of American Housing sponsored by the Cincinnati-Kharkiv Housing Initiative. Plans formalized for a design studio involving The University of Cincinnati, Miami University, and Kharkiv University faculty and students.

August 1991

A professor from the Kharkiv Polytechnic Institute lectures at UC's College of Applied Sciences.

June 1991

5 architects travel to Kharkiv to continue work on the Friendship Park and housing projects.

April 1991

A medical delegation of 6 people travels to Kharkiv to explore areas of mutual collaboration.

2 baking specialists arrive from Kharkiv for a 2-month stay with Busken Bakery.

March 1991

2 Cincinnati architects and 1 builder travel to Kharkiv to explore the creation of a Friendship Park and restoration of the Kharkiv Choral Synagogue.

February 1991

A Kharkivite starts a professional apprentice program at Instant Replay.

January 1991

Delegation of 7 Kharkiv attorneys visits Cincinnati.

October 1990

Delegation of 6 Kharkiv architects here to discuss possibilities of architectural cooperation and city planning.

June 1990

Nine-member delegation of Cincinnati attorneys travels to Kharkiv to exchange information with their counterparts.
